Tradition One Long form "Each member of Alcoholic Anonymous is but a small part of a great whole. AA must continue to live or most of us will die. Hence our common welfare comes first. But individual welfare follows close afterward." I had the privilege to attend the International Convention in Toronto in 2005. I was amazed how Tradition One was put into practice. I met people from all over our country and world who were there to celebrate the gift of sobriety and our Fellowship.

Tradition One also applies to our groups and the Georgia Area

Assembly. In January we will continue to vote on motions that pertain to the Pre-Paid Inventory. I hope you have had a chance at your Home Group to review the motion so you're group as a voice. I am extremely grateful for all our Traditions, especially Tradition One with a principle of unity.

Bill W. wrote several articles regarding unity. In the pamphlet, AA Traditions How It Developed, it states "When an alcoholic applies the Twelve Steps of our recovery program to his personal life, his disintegration stops and his unification begins. The Power which now holds him together in one piece overcomes those forces which had rent him apart. Exactly the same principle applies to each AA group and to Alcoholics Anonymous as a whole. So long as the ties which bind us together prove far stronger than those forces which would divide us if they could, all will be well. We shall be secure as a movement; our essential unity will remain a certainty." The pamphlet goes on to say "But AA unity cannot automatically preserve itself. Like personal recovery, we shall always have to work to maintain it. Here, too, we surely need honesty, humility, openmindedness, unselfishness, and above all-vigilance."

Sobriety and being a member of Alcoholics Anonymous has personal responsibility. I have a duty to pass along what was so freely given to me. Also, I have an obligation to encourage others. I am grateful for the people in my life who have come to me and said "I think you would do a good job at ... or you could stand for that position".

I look forward to meeting you at the Assembly or one of the Cluster Forums.

### **Traditions Checklist**

As many of you know, the AA Grapevine publishes so much more than a monthly magazine: books of collected articles on specific topics, calendars of our artwork, wall displays such as "The Man on the Bed," the Serenity Prayer, AA Slogans and much more. All to enhance our sobriety and remind us of our message.

One such special publication is the Traditions Checklist. It is especially useful to any AA group that struggles to get folks to participate in Traditions meetings. This very handy little leaflet can be a real lifesaver to anyone who bravely volunteers to chair a Traditions meeting! Each Tradition is listed, with a group of specific questions for each to help us to think about and apply each tradition

to both our group AND our own lives. Since it is January, let's kick the year off with the questions for Tradition One: "Our common welfare should come first: personal recovery depends upon AA unity."

- •Am I in my group a healing, mending, integrating person, or am I divisive? What about gossip and taking other members' inventories? •Am I a peacemaker? Or do I, with pious preludes such as "just for the sake of discussion," plunge into argument?
- •Am I gentle with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I abrasive?
- •Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in anoth-
- •Do I put down some AA activities

as if I were superior for not participating in this or that aspect of AA? •Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support, in every way I can, AA as a whole, or just the parts I understand and approve of? •Am I as considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me? •Do I spout platitudes about love

- while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?
- •Do I go to enough AA meetings or read enough AA literature to really keep in touch?
- •Do I share with AA all of me, the bad and the good, accepting as well as giving help of fellowship?

Did you find yourself in this list anywhere? I sure did, as I do each time I read it. I hope you will consider using this checklist for your group meetings and for your own recovery.

What is the CPC (Cooperation with Professional Community) committee? Members of this committee provide information about AA to those who have contact with alcoholics through their profession. This group includes health care professionals, educators, members of the clergy, lawyers, social workers, union leaders, industrial managers and those working in the field of alcoholism. Information is provided about where we are, what we are, what we can do, and what we cannot do.

He told me he had been released, was voluntarily living at a recovery house, and had found a home group and a sponsor. I watched a home-

coming video of a released inmate returning to his family and children. AA has brought hope to many of those incarcerated who would never have received the message if it were not for AA members doing Corrections service work.

Our fellowship must be selfsupporting. We offer a suggested support plan for the GSRs to share with their groups. By being self-supporting, we can fully discharge our responsibilities to our beautiful fellowship in Georgia.

In those Districts and Zones where there is no central office, we suggest that the income, after all group expenses have been paid, be allocated as follows:

State Office, Macon – 50%, GSO – 30%, Pre-Paid Convention — 10%, District/Zone – 10%

In Atlanta, Augusta and any other District/Zone which supports a central office, we suggest that the income, after all group expenses have been paid, be allocated as follows:

Central Office – 35% State Office, Macon – 30%, GSO – 20%, Pre-Paid Convention – 10%, District/Zone – 5% or whatever percentages are in accordance with your group conscience.
