I recently attended the funeral of one of our Past Delegates. The service for Joycie W. was a great tribute to a woman that was dearly loved by her family, friends, and Alcoholics Anonymous. Her time in AA was described beautifully in her eulogy. "She spent 38 years involved in varying types of passion projects and service work, which led to her meeting people and developing enduring friendships and relationships that meant so much to her."

On the drive home I thought about my early days in AA when old-timers would take me to funerals for people in AA that I didn't know. I learned over time that our membership was about so much more than getting sober. The best examples of our Traditions are evident in how they show up in our

daily lives. I was learning about unity and belonging by paying my respects and being a part of our fellowship.

The first time I encountered the "group conscience" was in what my group called a business meeting. It looked and sounded more like a knock down drag out to me! When the issue had been discussed for quite some time, we voted, and they all acted like best friends again. I saw that AA could be a safe place to disagree and work through a problem. This was a new experience for someone afraid to express any opinion that might separate me from the pack. I was learning about our Ultimate Authority that was bigger than our differences. The group conscience prevailed.

I met my first best friend in AA, who would mentor me and teach me how we are all alike on the inside and everybody that suffers from alcoholism has a place in our rooms. AA was a place where people from all walks of

life were sitting together in rooms and sharing their struggles. At 43 years old, I had never experienced inclusivity and acceptance in any other organization like I saw in ours. Our disease levels the playing field.

When our group had to move to another location, we continued our regular meeting nights and times. There were several groups that met in the same church basement. One of those groups had a meeting at the same time as ours. This became an issue where we were asked to change our meeting night. The other group's attendance had fallen off and some of those mem-

Our 11th traditions states that "Our public relations policy is based on attraction rather than promotion: we need always maintain personal anonymity at the level of press, radio and films."

Our founders' intent of this tradition was that our "public persona" would not hinge on one person. That one person's likeness, image, name, reputation and or following should not be the public's impression and interpretation of the AA program.

Why, you may ask, do we have this? What is the difference between attraction and promotion? Should we give a free toaster with every new member? What about chips? Are they promotion? Bumper Stickers, now there's a little controversy. How about putting one of those inflatable men they use at used car lots in front of the club house? What about YouTube, InstaGram, Google? Are these promotions? What is it all about?

I'm reminded of going to department stores as a child and the pretty models would spritz my mother with various perfumes as we walked through the cosmetics department. You couldn't turn sideways without some blonde-haired beauty spraying you with the latest fragrance. Alongside the cosmetics counter, there was an attractive display of perfumes. It was well presented, and I remember it caught my mom's eye. There were tester bottles and pamphlets, sample bottles and scratch n sniff cards. There was a lady there handing out information and samples, creating plenty of attraction for the new line of fragrance.

So how does this relate to AA?
Think of the perfume counter as an AA display at a workshop or event. In PI (Public Information) work, we tell people the 5 Ws of AA. What AA is, who AA is for, why AA does what it does, where and when AA meetings are held. We also talk a little about the H, how AA works. The promotion would be the

"spritzing". We don't shove AA down anyone's throat. We don't go where

Working with Others By Don K., Chair Claire P., Co-Chair Area 16 Treatment / Accessibilities Committee

The Treatment side of our committee works with district and group treatment representatives to carry the A.A. message into hospitals and other facilities where there are people with a desire to stop drinking. But what happens when the newly sober alcoholic leaves the facility? They may have attended a few A.A. meetings near the facility, but what if they live in another city or state? We want to help those who wish to attend local A.A. meetings where they will live when they are released.

The Bridge the Gap program allows treatment facility patients to request an AA contact in their home area who then helps them find and attend a meeting. We accomplish this by educating facilities about Bridge the Gap and providing the contact information for the Area Treatment Committee or District Treatment Representative. If a patient wants a local contact in a specific area, the facility contacts us and we contact a local member in that district to act as the contact. The local member calls and offers to help the patient get to a meeting when they are released. If you are in contact with a facility and want to talk with them about the Bridge the Gap program, let us know.

Can every member or prospective member in your district attend your meeting? Are we considering the unseen barriers to attendance at meetings? The Accessibilities side of our committee helps groups make their meeting accessible to all who want to attend.

We look forward to seeing everyone at the September Assembly! If you are involved or want to become involved in doing service work in the areas of treatment and/or accessibility, please attend one of our workshops on Saturday at the Assembly.

- 2.) Go to the Area 16 website, aageorgia.org, and check out the directory

under the service tab. The password is Gssa@2006. Check on your group, district, or zone information. Are the names of the trusted servants correct? How about their contact information?

If you need to change any of this information, please go to aageorgia.org and do so.

Secondly, are we making sure that our group members know where to find information that will affect them? Do your group members know about the September Assembly and the elections for Delegate, Alternate Delegate, and Secretary? Have they seen the service resumes of those standing either in the print or on-line versions of The Georgia Message? Please make sure that your group knows about the elections and make time at your business meetings or group conscience meetings to discuss the candidates.

By using our tools of communication well, we can, as Bill said, surpass our present imagination, and can ensure that A.A. is there when the next suffering alcoholic, inside or outside the rooms, reaches out for help.

bers were attending our meeting. An old-timer from that group pulled me aside one night and told me that we were violating the Traditions and that I should know better (I was the DCM at that time). I was sure that he was wrong. Our group decided at our next business meeting to give up that slot. We knew that it was becoming difficult for all of us and thought that we would make this sacrifice for the other group. Years later it would hit me that the old-timer was right. Our group could certainly meet on any night and time that we chose but it was directly affecting another group.

These are a few examples of the many times I have had the experience of seeing our Traditions at work in the rooms. How our Traditions teach me usually is the same way they came into being in the first place. I do something the wrong way until I learn a better way. Our Traditions are the result of trial and error. They are spiritual protection for our way of life.

The Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions states, "The Twelve Traditions apply to the life of the Fellowship itself. They outline the means by which A. A. maintains its unity and relates itself to the world about it, the way it lives and grows."
